

he Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead - home to Windsor Castle, Eton College, Ascot Racecourse and Legoland - sits in the prosperous commuter belt west of London.

If you're concerned about young upstarts, you can't get much more historic than 'Maiden Hythe' or 'Windlesora' - early monikers of Maidenhead and Windsor dating back to Anglo-Saxon times.

Today's settlers flock to the two towns not only for their ancient annals, but also for excellent educational establishments, a broad variety of housing built over the decades, and the blessings bestowed by upcoming Crossrail.

Maidenhead, which is in the SL6 postcode area and on the western fringes of the Elizabeth line - Crossrail's official name commemorating the Queen – has seen prices rise by 46% since the new rail link was announced seven years ago.

Commuters will be able to glide directly into Bond Street in 41 minutes, without changing from train to Tube, and arrive at Heathrow within 20 minutes from December 2019 when the Elizabeth line kicks off.

Although not directly on the route itself, Windsor will benefit from proximity to it. Values have jumped in the SL4 postcode district by 45%, says David Fell, research analyst at Hamptons International.

"So far this year, a record one in 10 homes sold for over £1 million in Windsor and Maidenhead, with the average price of a property at £605,920," he explains.

Windsor property values could soar higher, however, with talk of the privately initiated Windsor Link Railway. It would replace Windsor and Eton Riverside, and Windsor Central stations, speeding up the run further to the capital and Heathrow.

WINDSOR

Windsor has impeccable Royal connections - the Queen's weekend bolthole is Windsor Castle - the Thames, Great Windsor Park and good access to London. It's only 30 minutes to Paddington, 55 to Waterloo, and the M4 (Junction 6) is nearby.

"Windsor will be underpinned by two nearby Crossrail stations - Maidenhead on one side and Slough on the other," points out Savills' Charles Elsmore-Wickens.

Unlike property prices slumping in other parts of the country, Windsor's only suffered slight falls at the top end, Charles notes. "While the market at £1.5 million plus is less active, homes below £1 million are still selling well."

The regal town is popular with downsizers and young couples creeping out of London, according to Chris Littler of The Frost Partnership. "For the same amount as a Chiswick flat, you get a three-bedroom period property in Windsor."

There aren't many large new schemes under construction in the town, due to its archaic layout, but small infill schemes are cropping up in the core and in surrounding towns and villages.

The Frost Partnership's selling five remaining Regency-style houses from £840,000 in Datchet, and Hamptons International has four apartments from £535,000 left at Hogarth House, a period conversion smack next to the castle in the heart of Windsor.

Hamptons is also marketing the last two splitlevel apartments, starting at £350,000, at Alexandra Court, conveniently located on the town's High Street; and the final two flats, from £250,000, at Sefton Lodge on Clewer

Sebastian Stanford-Smith of Hamptons International is observing a shift towards local buyers, as higher levels of Stamp Duty tax discourage some buy-to-let landlords and Londoners finding it hard to sell their abodes in the capital.

"Nevertheless, we're getting young couples, single professionals and retirees hunting for homes in the area."

And Sebastian believes there will be renewed interest in large Victorian terraces and detached villas costing over £2 million in Windsor's Golden Triangle - the prized Kings, Osborne and Frances Roads.

"Those favouring a more semi-rural existence and larger gardens head for the villages of Fyfield, Holyport and Oakley Green, where price tags for houses are anything from £1 million-£30 million," he adds.



MAIDENHEAD

The big game changer in Maidenhead - whose local Member of Parliament is no less than Prime Minister Theresa May – is the £300 million major transformation of the town over the next decade by Countryside and the local borough.

Four council-owned sites at York Road, West Street, Reform Road and Saint-Cloud Way will be revitalised, delivering 1,200 new homes, shops, restaurants, offices and a cultural quarter for the heart of Windsor.

Countryside's senior development manager Zoe Mulholland says the developer hopes to start building by the end of 2018.

"The project's based around a new town square. By bringing homes and upmarket bars and restaurants to the centre, more retail and footfall will follow, improving Maidenhead's economy."

In addition, charity Maidenhead Waterways is in the process of restoring and enlarging the town's channels, which can only advance the town more.

"This is a really up-and-coming area," comments Henry Day of Riverhomes. "Maidenhead has a lovely stretch of water, where some homes come with direct river access and their own moorings.

To buy a smart waterfront home, you need to be in a position to proceed quickly with a sale, advises Henry. "Sell your own house first and then go looking on the Thames, or you'll be broken-hearted.

Maidenhead isn't just about road and rail networks and the water. It's also a foodie paradise, with Heston Blumenthal and the Roux Brothers in nearby Bray, and Tom Kerridge and a branch of The Ivy in Marlow.

It's no wonder that luminaries such as George and Amal Clooney, Ricky Gervais and Russell Brand own property locally. Even Brad Pitt considered buying a home when he was over here filming.

And yet, you don't need to be a millionaire to pick up a new flat starting at £294,500 at Redrow Homes' The Loftings, or a detached house costing £880,000 at Spitfire Bespoke Homes' Green Gates near the station.

Things do get pricier on the water. A new four-bedroom villa on the river at neighbouring Taplow Riverside by the Berkeley Group will set you back at least £2 million.

And a period mansion on its own Thames island with nine bedrooms, tennis court, cinema, gym and library like the Clooneys'? Only George and Amal know the figures, but it's reckoned the house and renovations ran to about £30 million.

No matter what sector of the market you make your purchase, everyone's likely to profit in Windsor or Maidenhead - towns with interesting pasts, and, thanks to a flourishing transportation system and fine-looking homes, a bright future.

- The Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead is the only royal borough outside Greater London.
- Princess Margaret and the Rolling Stones stayed at Skindles Hotel now Berkeley Homes' Taplow Riverside - on the river outside Maidenhead. Now, Michel Roux's opening a new restaurant there.
- William the Conqueror built Windsor Castle in the 11th century.
- In 2012, Chris Brown was appointed as town crier of Windsor. The previous town crier retired in 1892 – the post had been vacant for 110 years.
- Current Maidenhead Bridge dates from 1777 and was built at a cost of £19,000.
- · King Charles I met his children for

- the last time before his execution in 1649 at the Greyhound Inn on Maidenhead High Street, where NatWest Bank's now located.
